

Contemporary Pharmacy: Issues, Challenges and Expectations 2024

March 22 Lithuania, Kaunas



Dear colleagues

We would like to invite you to participate in the International conference "Contemporary Pharmacy: Issues, Challenges and Expectations 2024" that will be held on 22nd March 2024.

The conference is dedicated to the initiator of pharmacy studies in Kaunas, Professor Petras Raudonikis (1869-1950). In 2024, we will celebrate his 155th birth anniversary. Prof. Raudonikis started his academic career in Kaunas in 1920 as the head of the Pharmacy Section of the Higher Courses, the precursor institution to the University of Lithuania, which was established in 1922. He was active in the creation of the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Lithuania, and until 1939 headed the Department of Pharmacy at that university. In interwar Lithuania, he was the most competent and respected pharmacy teacher, distinguished not only in academic, but also in practical, organizational and public activities. During 1924-1929, Prof. Raudonikis was the secretary of the Faculty of Medicine Council, and from 1929-1933, the secretary of the University Council and the Senate.

The International conference "Contemporary Pharmacy: Issues, Challenges and Expectations 2024" is focused on the novelties of pharmacy science and practice in response to contemporary challenges within the historical background. It will bring together scientists, pharmacists, and other healthcare workers, providing the international research community in research and learning with an opportunity to present, discuss and publish recent research results and approaches to develop new ideas and collaborations.

The conference program will feature special thematic sessions for pharmacy professionals and scientists. Young scientists and students' presentations will be competing for the Best Presentation Award.

All submitted abstracts will pass through a peer-review process and will be published in the abstract book.

Call for abstracts:

Pharmacy and other biomedicine field scientists and students are invited to present their research and share experience on all aspects of Pharmaceutical Sciences.

Instructions for authors:

The presenting author is expected to participate in live session and present their oral presentation or poster. The presenting author is required to ensure that all co-authors are aware of the content of the abstract before submission. All abstracts will be reviewed, and authors will be informed about acceptance till February 22nd.

The abstract in MS Word format is limited to 300 words count with no artwork and /or table. Max 250 words with only one artwork and /or table are allowed, artwork and table should be inserted into the text in the appropriate place. Text, artwork/table, and references must be on one page.

Artwork could be inserted using the commands Paste Special/Picture (Windows Metafile) or Insert picture/From file. Each of them should be clearly identified with a caption and its number. Fig 1., Table 1. Table text size is 10 pt.

Instructions for preparing poster:

Poster size should not exceed A0 (84.1 x 118.9 cm) format. We recommend using the A1 format when creating your poster. The poster must be of a vertical (portrait) design. The poster must be in English.

In the poster you should include:

- Title (with names of authors and affiliations);
- o Background;
- Methods;
- o Results;
- o Conclusion;
- References.

Use both UPPER and lower case letters for general content, as the all-capital text is difficult to read. Do not use more than 2-3 fonts and 3-4 text sizes, for example:

- Title 100 pt bold sans-serif or Garamond font;
- Section Heading 40-48 pt bold sans-serif or Arial font;
- Body Text 26-32 pt sans-serif or Arial font;
- o Captions 26-32 pt sans-serif or Arial font.

Make sure there is enough contrast between the color of the text and the poster's background. Choose a simple color scheme with only two or three related colors. Change colors on graphs and figures in a way that complements the background color. A light background and black letters are the best combinations and the easiest to read.

Make sure ideas flow logically from one section to the next. Use charts and graphs to illustrate data (avoid raw data and large tables, but if you must include them, keep them simple). Each illustration should be self-descriptive (everything that is depicted in images or graphs must be named).
